

## Letter from the Rector

Dear Friends,

*It came upon the midnight clear, that glorious song of old*  
Our traditional Christmas carols continue to be popular, not only in our church services, but in various other ways, such as concerts, recordings, and background music we hear around shops and other public places at this time of year. But how much attention do we give to the words of those carols?

If we pay attention to the words we hear or sing, they can remind us, or even bring to life for us for the first time, the good news of what God has done for us, in the birth and life of Jesus.

The carol I have quoted the opening lines of above, continues by reminding us of the words of the angels to the shepherds:

*'Peace on the earth, good will to men,  
From heaven's all gracious King!'*

And this promise is contrasted with state of our world today, in words that are just as relevant now as they were when they were written well over a hundred years ago.

*Beneath the angel-strain have rolled  
Two thousand years of wrong;  
And man, at war with man, hears not  
The love-song that they bring:*

The carol ends with a vision of God's future, when all things shall be in peace and harmony, echoing the angels' song, and also advises us:

*O hush the noise, ye men of strife,  
And hear the angels sing.*

In this Christmas time, may we take time to stop and listen, so that familiar words may speak to us in a new way, and we can grasp something more of the good news of God's love, that is at the heart of the celebration of Christmas.
