Letter to the Editor

As residents of London End Lane, we constantly have the pleasure of lots of walkers, hikers, cyclists and dog walkers. Most people are friendly and stop for a chat, or just to admire the view.

However, sadly, there are an increasing number who simply use the Lane as a "dog loo", despite there being a bin provided and a home made scooper available. The dogs are not to blame, they don't know any better, but the owners are. It takes only a few seconds to pick up after your dog and deposit it in the receptacle provided. It is clearly recognisable and the council empty it regularly.

If owners do not clean up after their animals, it creates a health risk for anyone who walks down the lane. If your child became ill because they had fallen over and put their hand into an offending deposit, you would be distraught. We have had occasions where a child has fallen over and someone in the Lane has had to lend use of their washing facilities.

If a dog continually fouled outside your property you would not be very amused, and neither are we, why are owners being so selfish? If you want to use the Lane, please respect it!

One weekend recently was particularly tragic. A careless owner let their dog off the lead well before the woods and it ran amok in our fields at the end of the Lane. This resulted in the death of one of our chickens. These are our pets, we love them to bits, we spoil them, and enjoy looking after them. Weekends are the only time that they

can roam free as chickens should, because we are around to keep an eye on them.

Unfortunately these things happen all too quickly, Keith was in the garage and I had popped into the house, the dog chased the chickens terrifying them in the process and one of our babies was dead.

Please, please, can dog owners take responsibility to ensure that their animals are kept under proper control and on a lead until they are well into the woods.

We want people to continue to use and enjoy the lane as it is a beautiful place, but spare a thought for those of us who live there, human, animal and chicken, leave it as you found it safe, free from dog foul, and safe for everyone.



Letter from the Rector

Dear Friends,

*“How wonderful the work of your hands, O Lord.
As a mother tenderly gathers her children,
you embraced us as your own.”*

On Sunday 6th March we celebrate Mothers Day. It is not always easy to see how we can celebrate Mothers Day in a positive way, which is also real and honest.

It is right that we celebrate all the good things about our mothers, as well as our fathers, and others who love and care for us. There is no such thing as the perfect family, but there is much that we can give thanks to God for.

However, we also need to acknowledge that every family experiences some tensions and difficulties, and some of us have to deal with break-ups and separation. Sadly, for a few people, their experience of home and family is of a place of fear and abuse.

And yet we all have a notion of what good family life could be, and of what it means to be a good father or mother. The words I have quoted above come from our Holy Communion service, and they remind us that, for those of us who have had a good experience of family life, the loving care of God is even better. While, for those of us who have had a negative experience of parents and family, we may find in God a love that is greater than that of the best human carer, father, or mother.
