THANKSGIVING SERVICE – SUNDAY SEPTEMBER 9TH





GREEN DEAL ON THE HORIZON

The Green Deal is a government scheme which provides a framework for householders to access energy saving measures at <u>no up-front cost</u> assessing what the householders would most benefit from. If for example you wished solid wall insulation and a new high efficiency boiler to go ahead, then you'd get a low-interest loan for the costs involved. The Golden Rule is that payback of this loan should come from savings that the householder makes as a result of the improvements being made, and full payback must be made within a 25 year time period (or earlier in the case of some technologies). The loan is attached to the electricity meter at the house, so wouldn't need to be paid off when you sold your home, unless you chose to. Repayments of the loan are collected by the electricity supplier.

In the case of loft and cavity wall insulation, current funding which makes this available, professionally installed, for free will end when the Green Deal comes in. This means that there are only a few weeks left (likely to be until end September) to make this energy efficiency improvement. The 'Buckinghamshire Affordable Warmth Network' can help, and is supported by your local council. Have your say on new ward boundaries for Milton Keynes

The independent Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE) is asking local people for their help to draw up a new pattern of wards for Milton Keynes Council.

This week the Commission announced that it was minded to accept Milton Keynes Council's proposal for an increase in the number of councillors who should represent the community in future. The Commission is therefore proposing that 57 councillors should represent Milton Keynes, six more than at present.

The Commission now needs information from people and groups across Milton Keynes to help it to produce a new pattern of wards to accommodate 57 councillors.

In drawing up new boundaries, the Commission aims to deliver electoral equality for voters in council elections so that each councillor represents approximately the same number of voters.

The review also aims to ensure that the new council wards reflect, as far as possible, the interests and identities of communities across Milton Keynes.

Max Caller, Chair of the Commission, said: "The starting point of an electoral review is for the Commission to take a view on the number of councillors who should represent the authority in future.

"On the evidence presented to the Commission, we are minded to recommend that Milton Keynes Council should have 57 councillors.

"We're now asking local people and organisations to help us draw up new wards for the whole area. As we develop the recommendations, we'll take into account local community identities as well as ensuring electoral equality for voters.

"Your views will make a difference.


"We will carefully consider all evidence that is provided during this phase of the review whoever it is from and whether it applies to the whole of Milton Keynes or just a small part of it.

"We will publish all the submissions on our website so that local people can see all the various proposals we receive. Residents will then have a further chance to have their say after we publish our draft recommendations in January 2013."

In the Past

Most of us appreciate living in a village surrounded by attractive woodland and fields but not so long ago the surrounding countryside was vital for providing everyday sustenance. School records show that in October 1879 school attendance was small because the children were gleaning. In June 1893 the woods were opened for huckleberrying, very few children arrived at school and so it was closed. In January 1898 the woods were opened for wooding and again attendance was affected.

Perhaps most rewarding of all was when (recorded for December 1907) many children were absent from school in order to go to Woburn to fetch gifts of venison.
